

My Journey, and the Footprints I have left behind...

I was taught at an early age that, "If you have passion with purpose, then you are unstoppable." If you are passionate about what you do, and fully embrace what your heart loves; your success will leave footprints everywhere you go! My "WHY" in life is to serve others and make a dent or a positive "footprint" in their life. I have always committed myself to sustaining and elevating a job to new heights. With that commitment, I like to think that I have left my footprints of success at each program through clarity of purpose, high standards, hard work, championship effort, open communication, and unselfish teamwork.

I always strive to create an environment designed to achieve excellence by leading by example, building relationships, enforcing discipline, and fostering mutual respect and trust. At five different programs where I've accumulated 460 coaching career wins within 27 years, I have enjoyed success at all college levels including Divisions I, II, III, while both starting and rebuilding programs. I love being involved with the community and camps while developing players into future leaders. Top recruiting classes, academic success, broken game attendance records, combined with numerous sell-outs, and players that go on to play in the WNBA and overseas, are some of my crowning achievements.

Lady of Firsts is a title I have been honored to be given through the years. My journey began when I became the first player in NCAA history in 1994 to score 2,000 points and accumulate 1,000 assists! I was also the only player in the NCAA history to Lead the nation in a statistical category four years in a row. I led the nation in Assists 1990-1994 in the NCAA record book. I enjoyed leading my teammates to score and seeing the reaction of Joy on their face, just like I enjoy assisting people in life to set a vision to accomplish their goals for success.

After my playing career I had a choice to play professional basketball or startup a college program in my hometown at, Newport News, where my dad, grandfather, and uncles attended the Apprentice School. In the 75-year history of the school, they had never had a women's team. I decided to pursue my coaching career and I was hired at the age of 22 years old to build a women's basketball program from scratch and fielded a team with just 6 players that went 12-2 their first year. Eventually, I led the team to win the school's first ever National Championship in 2001. Being inducted in their first inaugural Hall of Fame was incredibly rewarding. I received the 2001 Peninsula Sports Club "Special Achievement Award" for winning the school's first ever National Championship in 2001.

I continued to leave my footprints in four more colleges. I guided Lenoir-Rhyne Bears to their first ever championship and NCAA appearance. I then assisted the Legendary Wendy Larry to three championships at ODU. As head coach, I went on to rebuild Elon's program and help them earn their first 20win season in their Division I era, including first post-season play to the WBI. Accumulating over 100 wins at ODU as Head Coach, including three post season opportunities, was another success that I am proud of. As the Head Coach at UNCW, along with our dedicated student athletes, I redirected the program into winning ways both on and off the floor. During my tenure, we had the best start non-conference in 10 years, and in 2018-19 that secured the team's first winning season in seven years. The Seahawks also authored a 13-1 mark inside Trask Coliseum, most wins in school history in the Division I Era.

I am a proud owner of Barefoot Motivation, LLC where motivating people has always been my #1 drive in life.

There have been many highlights in the area of community service. I was honored to be featured in the April 2019 edition of WILMA Magazine and was nominee for the Cape Fear YWCA Woman of the Year Award in May of 2019. In addition, at ODU my women's basketball team earned a prestigious award in our athletic department "The Monarch Cup " for service in our community. I've been headline speaker to for many speaking engagements Professional organizations and companies (i.e. NCAA Leadership Academy, Newport News Shipbuilding, Home Depot, ADS, and Rotary Clubs), graduations, numerous podcasts, headlined the Norfolk, Chesapeake and Peninsula Sports Clubs during awards luncheons and dinners. I was featured in a commercial by Old Point Bank reflecting my love and service for the community. I was recognized by my Alma Mater, Christopher Newport University, as a top 50 Distinguished Alumni.

The exciting part is that I look forward to the newest adventure of my journey where I will have the opportunity to leave even more footprints! Four-time Hall of Famer...I'm here!

SUMMARY

Earned the recognition of becoming the 1st male or female basketball player to record 2,000 points and 1,000 assists in a career for any NCAA division. Began coaching career at the age of 22 and am a proven winner that has made history in starting a program, resurrecting programs, winning championships which includes winning a national championship. A nationally known women's basketball coach who has built successful programs at five different institutions on and off the court by producing success in the classroom and in the community. Throughout my 27-year coaching career, was a part of 20 winning seasons and holds an overall coaching 440 wins and head coaching wins at 363. Known as the lady of FIRSTS, leaving footprints and achieving things that have yet to be accomplished.

CAREER PROFILE

Head Collegiate Coach (NCAA Division I) University of North Carolina at Wilmington (2017-2022)

- During the 2021-22 season, the Seahawks compiled a 3.3 grade point average during the fall semester, which was the highest team GPA in school history.
- The Seahawks opened the 2017-18 season by posting a 7-4 non-conference record, including a 6-0 start inside Trask Coliseum. It marked the program's best start in 10 years.
- UNCW authored an 18-12 overall record in 2018-19 to mark the program's first winning season in seven years.
- The Seahawks matched a program record by winning 13 home games during the 2018-19 campaign and won its first 12 home contests.
- UNCW earned a share of third place in the 2018-19 Colonial Athletic Association regular season standings after posting an 11-7 league mark. The Seahawks earned the No. 3 seed for the CAA Championship, representing the program's highest seed in the tournament since 2011.
- During the 2018-19 season, UNCW was the only CAA team to defeat James Madison in regular season play by virtue of a 66-63 victory over the Dukes inside Trask Coliseum on Jan. 18, 2019.
- A trio of student-athletes earned All-CAA recognition at the conclusion of the 2018-19 season, marking the first time in program history three Seahawks have been named to the All-CAA team in the same season. Shrita Parker and GiGi Smith earned Second-Team All-CAA distinction while Lacey Suggs was a Third-Team selection.
- After leading the Seahawks to their upset victory over James Madison, Shrita Parker became the first UNCW player to earn the United States Basketball Writers Association's National Player of the Week Award on Jan. 22, 2019.
- Following her graduation from UNCW, Shrita Parker signed a professional contract to play for Glanmire in the Irish Super League. Parker was named as the league's 2019-20 Player of the Year after averaging 22.9 points, 5.8 rebounds and 4.1 assists per game.
- A pair of UNCW student-athletes have been named as the Colonial Athletic Association's Women's Basketball Scholar- Athlete of the Year. Rebekah Banks earned the award for the 2017-18 season while former walk-on Lacey Suggs was the 2019-20 recipient.
- Rebekah Banks was also the recipient of the 2017-28 UNCW Chancellor's Cup Award, marking the first time a women's basketball player has earned the honor since the award's inception in 1986-87.
- During the 2019-20 season, the Seahawks excelled in the classroom. The team compiled a 3.259 grade point average during the fall semester with 12 student-athletes posting a 3.0 GPA or better. In a difficult spring semester which included online learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Seahawks shined with a 3.195 team GPA while eight student-athletes reached the 3.0 or better mark.
- Coach Karen Barefoot has made an impact in the Wilmington community during her three years as the Seahawks' head coach. She was featured in the April 2019 edition of WILMA Magazine and was a nominee for the Cape Fear YWCA Woman of the Year Award in May 2019.
- The Seahawks posted a perfect 1000 Academic Progress Rate score for three consecutive years (2017-2018, 2019-2020, 2020-2021) under Barefoot's Leadership.
- 4 In Fall 2021 the program recorded the highest GPA in a semester 3.32.
- Dave and Myra Ferris became the highest women's basketball donors under Barefoot's leadership with two gifts totaling \$135,049.
- Special Hall of Famer Alumni became the first person to donate a full scholarship to the program under Barefoot's era.

Head Collegiate Coach (NCAA Division I)

Old Dominion University, Norfolk, VA (2011-2017)

- Named the sixth leader of the Lady Monarchs in 2011 and has led the program to remarkable success. A two-time Conference USA Captain (NCAA Conference Representative), has elevated the team's academic success, while building upon the program's tradition during six seasons as the head coach, including two WNBA Draftees: Jennie Simms and Shae Kelly
 - 2016-17: Led Lady Monarchs to 17-14 overall record, including an 11-7 mark in Conference USA play, and finished sixth in the C-USA league standings

- Achieved her 300th career victory as a head coach with a come-from-behind 70-60 victory over rival VCU
- Notched 100th win as head coach at Old Dominion, when the Lady Monarchs defeated Charlotte, 72-70, on the road
- Led the team to win eight of its last 11 regular season games
- Coached Jennie Simms, the nation's second-leading scorer, to being named the 2016-17 Conference USA Player of the Year and an Honorable Mention AP All-American (the first ODU All-American since 2005), marking the first time since 2002 that an ODU women's basketball player was named the conference player of the year and drafted by the WNBA Washington Mystics in the 2nd Round, and the VaSID Player of the Year
- Guided a Lady Monarch team that led Conference USA in both rebounding (+8.3) and three-point field (.378) percentage during league play, while individuals Jennie Simms (26.1) and Destinee Young (10.9) led the league in scoring and rebounding
- Nearly upset top 20-ranked Miami (FL) in Coral Gables. Miami head coach Karen Meier called Barefoot's team "a tough package... back when Miami was terrible, we got good because we were gritty. Now that's Old Dominion. They're at that phase where we were. Every ball matters to them."
- Ranked in the top 16 percent in the country in average attendance, as ODU home games averaged 2,366 fans per game, which also ranked second in Conference USA
- Signed the No. 1 recruiting class in Conference USA for the second consecutive year, as the class also ranked 38th nationally and No. 1 in the state of Virginia
- 2015-16: Ended the season with a 17-17 overall record and a 10-8 mark in Conference USA play, advancing to the C-USA Tournament title game for the first time since joining the league and saw plenty of success along the way
 - Garnered ODU's 1,000th program win (only fourth NCAA Division I program to achieve that feat)
 - Led ODU to its first win at Middle Tennessee State, handing the Blue Raiders their just
 - six home conference loss in 11 years. Timmons' buzzer beater was featured as the No. 7 play on ESPN's SportsCenter Top-10 Plays segment
 - Inspired the team to be a defensive force and finished the season ranked in the top five in six defensive categories. Topped the league in rebounding margin (+6.7), while ranking second in field-goal percentage defense (.397), defensive rebounds (25.6) and defensive rebounding percentage (.691). The team was also third in scoring defense (62.2) and rebounding defense (33.6)
 - Helped promote season tickets and bring in 86 new ticket holders, helping the team rank in the top-13 percent in attendance (47th out of 349 Division I programs)
- 2014-15: Led the Lady Monarchs to a 21-13 overall record, which marked the most wins during the Barefoot era at ODU. Went a perfect 4-0 against in-state competition, taking down UVA, Virginia Tech, VCU and William & Mary, while advancing to the conference semifinals for the first time since the 2009-10 season
 - Led Old Dominion back to the WNIT, where the team advanced to the second round for the second consecutive year
 - Led ODU to its first win at Louisiana Tech
 - Ranked in the top-12 percent in attendance, averaging 2,623 fans per game
 - Had a total of eight players earn a 3.0 GPA or higher for the academic year and was an instrumental part of the program improving upon its multi and single-year APR standings and receiving a perfect single-year APR score of 1000 for the third time
- 2013-14: Coached the Lady Monarchs to an 18-16 record, including a trip to the second round of the WNIT, and led the squad to a first-round bye in the C-USA tournament in the school's first season within the conference. Garnered 250th career win in a thrilling overtime comeback victory over Marshall (2/1) and pulled in the 43rd ranked recruiting class in the nation and first in Conference USA
- 2012-13: Guided ODU to a 9-3 start in non-conference action, which was the best start since the 1998-99 season. Tallied 19 wins, an eight-win turnaround from the 2011-12

season, which was tied for 14th best nationally and earned a spot in the WNIT.

 2011-12: Made presence known on the recruiting trail, signing the Virginian-Pilot Player of the Year, Galaisha Goodhope, and the Peninsula District and Daily Press Player of the Year, LaQuanda Younger. Also signed junior college All-American Shae Kelley, who earned Ms. Colorado Basketball honors coming out of high school. The class marked a top-45 nationally ranked recruiting class and the No. 1 class in the CAA.

Player Development

- APR Turnaround Perfect 1,000 single-year APR in 2011-12 & 2013-14, 2014-15 and has drastically improved multi-year APR in five years (910 in 2010-11 to 972 in 2013-14)
- Improved team GPA and led the program to its highest GPA since tracking started in 2002 (3.01 cumulative team GPA in 2013-14)
- Mentored players to 20 all-academic awards, including two-time First Team CoSIDA All-Academic honoree Mairi Buchan
- Has had a total of eight players earn all-conference honors and coached the first ODU women's basketball C-USA Newcomer of the Year and also the first C-USA Player of the Year, which marked the first ODU conference player of the year since 2002
- Helped two players etch their names in the C-USA tournament record book, as lje
 Ajemba tied the record with 21 rebounds against the 49ers and Jennie Simms finished
 the 2016 tournament with 98 points, ranking her third all-time
- Guided Jennie Simms to becoming one of the program's all-time greatest scorers and leading to being selected as the 18th pick in the 2017 WNBA Draft to the Washington Mystics, being named ODU's Female Athlete of the Year, C-USA Player of the year and VaSID Player of the Year. Simms set the ODU single-season scoring record (26.0), the TED Constant Center single game women's scoring record (43) and climbed the all-time scoring list to No. 5. Simms became the third player in school history to score 2,000 points in her first three seasons at ODU and also set program records for career 30+ and 40+ scoring games
- ODU graduate Shae Kelley was selected No. 35 overall in the 2015 WNBA Draft by the Minnesota Lynx and helped lead the team to the 2015 WNBA Championship, while Tia Lewis earned a tryout with the WNBA's Washington Mystics in 2012

4 Community Outreach

- Renewed fan and community support by initiating Education Day at ODU and have had three consecutive Education Day sell outs (8,472 fans 2014 & 2015, 8,563 in 2016), as the 2016 attendance mark broke the Ted Constant Center record
- Started 'Barefoot'n Night' in support of Samaritan's Feet
- Fund-Raiser Inspiring a \$250,000 donation for the practice facility, orchestrating the highly successful golf tournament, auction and pre-party fundraisers
- Golf Tournament raised \$50,000 in 2015, which is the largest scholarship golf tournament fundraiser for ODU Athletics
- Inspired team to be heavily involved in the community and led the team to the Monarch Cup Award for Community Service

Head Collegiate Coach (NCAA Division I) Elon University, Elon, NC (2008-2011)

- Served as the head coach at Elon from 2008-2011 and helped the program reach new heights, while increasing its RPI from 320 in first season to 158 in third for one of the best turnarounds in all of Division I
 - 2008-09: Defied the odds and made an appearance in the Southern Conference Tournament quarterfinals
 - **2009-10:** More than doubled overall wins in second year at the helm and led the program to its second-consecutive conference tournament appearance
 - o 2010-11: Finished the season with a 20-13 record the program's best season at the Division I

level. The program's 11 home victories also marked the most home wins in a single season in the Division I era, while the team's fourth seed in the Southern Conference tournament marked to program's highest finish in school history. The team also made a postseason appearance in the Women's Basketball Invitational, which was a program first since joining Division I. Also led Elon to 12 victories in SoCon play, which tied Elon's record, and led the team with its highest attendance numbers in school history.

🖊 🛛 Player Development

- 2010 Recruiting class topped the Southern Conference (110 ranked nationally), while 2011 class was the best overall in Elon women's basketball history (71st nationally by All-Star Girls Report, 2nd in the Southern Conference)
- Displayed recruiting strength by bringing in Ali Ford, the North Carolina Athlete of the Year coming out of high school. During her collegiate career, Ford became the first second Freshman of the Year and First Team All-Conference honoree at Elon in its Division I era. After graduating, she continued her playing career and represented the USA in the 2015 FIBA Games. My recruit and player Tiara Gause became Elon's FIRST Freshman of the year a year earlier.
- Stressed the importance of academics and had 11 players selected to the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in fall of 2010, the most in program history. The overall team GPA that semester was a 3.15.
- Coached Ali Ford who was chosen for Elon University Hall of Fame honors in 2022.

Assistant Collegiate Coach (NCAA Division I) Old Dominion University, Norfolk, VA (2008-2011)

- Spent three years as assistant under head coach Wendy Larry, helping the team compile a 77-23 record and rank in top 30 in NCAA women's basketball attendance during tenure
 - **2005-06:** Finished the season with a record of 22-9 (17-1 CAA), winning 15th consecutive CAA conference title and made 23rd trip to the NCAA Tournament
 - **2006-07:** Finished the season with a record of 24-9 (17-1 CAA) and won 16th consecutive CAA conference title and made the program's 24th trip to NCAA Tournament
 - 2007-08: Claimed a season record of 31-5, earning the CAA Regular Season and Tournament Champion titles. The program ended season with a twenty-one game home winning streak, including a Sweet 16 run in the NCAA Tournament by defeating 12th-seeded Liberty and fourth- seeded Virginia. The Lady Monarchs season closed with a No. 10 ranking in both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Polls
- Attended the Villa 7 Consortium presented by Nike in Portland, Ore. created to develop Division I assistant coaches into competitive Division I head coaches
- Promoted the program through community involvement, speaking to groups and developing a positive relationship with the media
- Liaison to women's basketball booster club and assisted with annual golf tournament that raised \$45,000 in 2006 and \$46,000 in 2007

Head Collegiate Coach (NCAA Division II) Lenoir-Rhyne College, Hickory, NC (2001-2005)

- Achieved many "firsts" after becoming the head coach of the program in 2001 and compiled a 70-44 overall record
 - Led the program to its best season in 15 years with a 19-9 record during first season
 - Captured the first South Atlantic Conference regular season title in school history in 2003-04 enroute to claiming league Coach of the Year honors
 - Grabbed the first SAC tournament championship in school history in 2002-03
 - Led team to first-ever trip to the NCAA Division II National Tournament in 2002-03, finishing the season ranked eighth in the region
 - Led the conference in scoring defense and rebounding margin in 2003-2004
